



## Responses Overview Active








1. What grade(s) is/are your child(ren) in?






2. How many children do you currently have enrolled at our school?




7. Last year, student fees were used to purchase school supplies for all students. Would you like the school to continue providing school supplies using student fees?








9. Would you support a modest increase in fees if it meant enhanced programming or resources?
